

The most consistent and notable way to describe 2019 was change. Changes in personnel occurred in every division, from command staff to clerical. One of the few positions that was not affected was the chief's position, but that position did not have much tenure, as March of 2019 marked my first full year as chief for EMPD. There were three new officers hired, one slated for 2020, one new clerical, and four promotions in 2019. The vacancies that were created for the new hires and promotions created challenges in keeping a consistent work flow. Having two new captains and a vacant administrative assistant position is something that was not entirely anticipated. The fact that our daily operations at EMPD are often dictated by the public needs and the calls we receive, helps our staff prepare for things that happen unexpectedly. It's the nature of our profession.

The patrol division worked short-staffed the entire year due to vacancies, injuries, and FMLA leave. This division was down five officers that were not in the patrol schedule. That is tough to manage when the entire patrol division is comprised of 18 officers including supervisors. Patrol is the backbone of this department, so temporary changes had to be made to support them. Our Community Service Officer (CSO) was pulled from her duties to fill in on the road. The patrol officer assigned to the Special Investigative Unit (SIU), who primarily conducts drug investigations, was pulled to work patrol. Overtime was used to back-fill and trainings had to be limited to avoid shorting patrol any further. Our proactive policing methods did suffer, especially traffic enforcement, as some days officers went call to call their entire shifts. But, we all made it through the busy summer months and welcomed the slow return of officers back to their schedules. They are an extremely resilient group of fine men and women that rose to the challenge. Their

level of commitment and compassion is unparalleled. It is truly a pleasure working with them and

the communities we serve are very fortunate.

The detective bureau, consisting of a detective and a detective sergeant, had challenges also. The

detective position was vacant for a period of time due to a promotion to the rank of sergeant. The

detective sergeant position was on temporary light duty for several weeks, which restricted activity

outside the office.

Our support staff or clerical division usually consists of four employees, including the

administrative assistant position. By the end of 2019, they were functioning with two employees.

Jill and Carrie did a phenomenal job keeping us afloat for a few months until positions were filled

in 2020.

A silver lining in all the personnel vacancies was the budget. EMPD came in under budget again

in 2019, allowing funds to be transferred to the undesignated fund balance. Those monies are used

for retirement payouts so operations does not suffer upon each retirement.

Even though challenges and changes are a constant, I believe that having the right people in the

right places is paramount in moving an organization forward. At times 2019 felt like treading

water; however, I see a progressive future ahead of us to keep us on a path of continuous

improvement. The only thing that could possibly slow us down in 2020 is some unprecedented

novel virus that creates a health emergency that no one would expect or predict. But what are the

odds of that?

Major Case Investigations

The Department investigated several major cases in 2019. Many of the more involved investigations mentioned here are on-going and continue well into 2020 before possibly coming to a conclusion and may be awaiting trial.

One of the cases in May included a shooting following an argument between patrons at the Kelly Club bar in Weston. Following the shooting, other bar patrons quickly acted, subduing and detaining the shooting suspect until police arrived. The Wisconsin Department of Justice Crime Scene Response Unit assisted the department in processing the crime scene. The suspect was charged for attempted first-degree intentional homicide among other crimes and he awaits trial.

In October, EMPD investigated a suspicious fire at a multi-unit apartment complex in the City of Schofield where the suspect was later determined to have committed and attempted a number of arsons. The suspect was charged with numerous offenses related to the investigation to include: numerous counts of attempted 1st-degree intentional homicide, arson of a building and a number of attempted arson charges. The suspect awaits trial. The department held the fire investigation crime scenes over the course of two days and utilized the Marathon County Bomb Squad to assist in clearing the apartment homes and garages. Residents of the apartment complex were displaced during the investigation. Assistance was sought from the Salvation Army and Marathon County Emergency Management.

In early May, there was a head-on crash involving two cars, east of the intersection of Camp Phillips and Townline Roads. Both drivers were killed; one adult and one teenager. EMPD responded, aided by the Marathon County Sheriff's Office, the Wisconsin State Patrol, and the South Area Fire and Emergency Response District (SAFER).

In early April, officers were sent to a restaurant in Schofield for the report of a disturbance and took witness reports about an employee who had been substantially beaten and forcibly kidnapped

from the restaurant. Officers were unable to locate the victim until she was released by the suspect later that day. The victim reported the suspect to be armed with a revolver handgun and he fleeing to Madison and then Chicago, Illinois. It was also reported he may attempt "suicide by cop" when confronted by an officer. He was also a suspect in an armed burglary of a different restaurant.

The suspect was located later in the morning, utilizing cellphone tracking technology. The assisting police agencies in Columbia County, Wisconsin contacted the suspect vehicle and were subsequently involved in a pursuit of the suspect in a stolen car. Attempts were made to stop the suspect vehicle by the use of tire deflation devices. The suspect vehicle was then involved in a high speed crash into a semi tractor-trailer on the interstate, while fleeing police at over 115 miles per hour. The Wisconsin Department of Justice, Division of Criminal Investigation completed an officer-involved death investigation related to the officers involved in the pursuit investigation. It was found the suspect in the kidnapping was armed with a loaded stolen handgun. The suspect was a passenger in the vehicle. The driver was a relative of the suspect. Both parties were killed in the crash.

EMPD detectives worked with the Marathon County Sheriff's Office, the Wausau Police Department, and other agencies to investigate numerous fast-food restaurant burglaries during the fall of 2019. The suspect(s) in these investigations stole an undisclosed amount of currency and caused significant damage to the businesses in the process. These investigations continue.

A local cellular telephone dealer was forcibly burglarized by two suspects, in early May. An estimated \$50,000 in cellphones and electronics were stolen. Marathon County Crime Stoppers was utilized to seek additional leads on the case. The investigation continues.

Another major investigation occurred in July regarding child neglect – causing great bodily harm. It was reported to police a 2-year old child was left unattended in a car overnight in Schofield by his father, who was suspected of using methamphetamine. The child's father was taken into custody, charged, and is currently awaiting trial.

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Field Training Program

The Field Training Officer (FTO) program had several major changes in 2019. I became the FTO Program Coordinator, and Sergeant John Rusinek took over the FTO supervisor duties. Officer Matthew Nelson attended FTO School and joined our team of FTOs. He will be a great asset to our FTO team. The FTO Manual was updated in 2019.

Christopher Walter successfully completed fourteen weeks of field training and moved to solo patrol. Since working solo patrol, Officer Walter has done a great job. Joshua Kriegel started the FTO program in early December. He has had several weeks of FTO training and is doing well.

Officer Tanner Uhlig and Officer Randy Dunkel successfully completed their first year at EMPD. They have successfully passed their probationary periods and are retained as full-time police officers.

Grants

EMPD participated in several Wisconsin Department of Transportation grants in 2019. This included participation in "Click it or Ticket" and "Driver Sober" campaigns. Due to our department's participation, EMPD was awarded three \$4000 equipment grants. Two of the \$4000 equipment grants were awarded for 2019 and the third \$4000 grant's funds will be awarded in 2020. The money from these grants is to be used towards equipment that will aid in traffic safety and enforcement. We purchased two squad MDC computers with mounts and docking stations, one radar unit, and 72 DOT highway rated traffic safety cones (several for every squad car) with the 2019 funds.

EMPD continued to participate in the Marathon County Traffic Task Force Grant through the Wisconsin Department of Transportation in 2019. The Marathon County Sheriff's department

receives and shares the funds from this grant with all participating agencies. This grant will continue through fall of 2020.

This Task Force sets dates in which multiple departments participate in eight hour traffic enforcement shifts in their communities. The goals of these shifts are to focus on seatbelt violations, distracted driving, and removing intoxicated drivers from the roadways of our communities, thereby promoting safety.

EMPD participated in several federal grants, including; the Bullet Proof Vest Partnership (BVP), Methamphetamine, and Heroin Grants. The BVP grant provides reimbursement for portions of bullet proof vests purchased by the department. Both Methamphetamine and Heroin Grants provide reimbursement for overtime wage expenses accrued during methamphetamine or heroin specific investigations. We will continue to participate in these grants in 2020.

Technology

The Village of Weston and Everest Metro Police Department began using new payroll software in late 2019. Administrative staff attended training at the end of October 2019 and the software went live in November. The ultimate goal is to eliminate paper timesheets, time off requests, and streamline these processes.

We also tested two software systems. The first was a scheduling software, Aladtec. After testing, it was found the system was not a good fit for our department at this time. Based on our agency's size, our schedule can change rapidly based on needs that arise. We would need a system that is more fluid.

EMPD completed participation in a DRAGON LE pilot program. Dragon LE is a dictation software tailored to law enforcement use. The pilot was successful and we are hoping to purchase Dragon LE and implement the system in 2020. This would streamline our report system, helping the department eliminate the delay caused by draft reports.

Special Investigations Unit (SIU)

Special Investigations Unit/Central Wisconsin Narcotics Task Force

The Everest Metropolitan Police Department (EMPD) works routinely in collaboration with the Marathon County Sheriff's Office (MCSO), one way is through our participation in the multi-agency Special Investigations Unit (SIU). SIU is comprised of a team of investigators of the MCSO, Wausau PD and the EMPD. The unit is primarily tasked with the investigation of local controlled substance trafficking and crimes occurring within the county, but also assist neighboring counties, state and federal agencies. They additionally provide community-based training, and



work as the lead on the multi-jurisdictional Methamphetamine regional task force and the Central Area Drug Enforcement Group (CEADEG) which is a narcotics task force inclusive of all police agencies within the county.



The MCSO is also home to the Central Wisconsin Narcotics Task Force (CWNTF) formed in the fall of 2018 after being approached by the federal government about the assignment of a special agent to SIU. CWNTF is led by MCSO and includes both state and federal agencies: the WI Department of Justice/Division of Criminal Investigation, the Federal Bureau of Investigation; investigators from the MCSO, Wausau PD and EMPD; an intelligence analyst assigned by the National Guard; and the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department. The task force was founded to focus on identifying leaders in criminal drug trafficking organizations and ultimately to make a more significant impact in dismantling and disrupting organizations. The CWNTF is funded primarily by MCSO, with some federal funding and is a culmination of investigators assigned to SIU working together as one unit.

EMPD assigns a patrol officer to the SIU for a limited period of approximately 2-4 years. The officer has an office based out of the MCSO and works their shift out of the MCSO. The officer brings with them the resources of the mutli-agency team as well as much specialized training and equipment to aid in current and future investigations. The most recent drug investigator, Officer Cody Swearingen, was assigned from his duties at SIU as a School Resource Officer at D.C. Everest Middle School in the beginning of the 2019-20 school year, after the school district and communities served by EMPD approved a 3rd school resource officer position. EMPD's most recent drug investigator was assigned from the ranks of the patrol division and will begin his assignment in April of 2020.
